P.C.C. Secretary's Report

The job of the PCC is to have oversight of the mission and ministry of HPC. To ensure that we are knowing Jesus and making him known as a church family, and to pray that the Lord would bless our endeavours. The APCM (Annual Parochial Church Council Meeting) and AGM took place in April 2022 and the PCC met in person for 6 'normal business' PCC meetings in May, July, September, November, February and in March 2023.

This past year has seen a significant change in the life of HPC as David Bourne announced, at the AGM in April 2022, his retirement as Vicar after serving so faithfully for the past 17 years. This led to a period of interregnum from 31st August 2022 and a series of additional special meetings with the PCC in preparation

for the Application process for the appointment of a new Vicar. A Church Society representative (Church Society is HPC Patron) and a representative from the Diocese attended one of these meetings which was extremely helpful in preparing the PCC for the Application process including preparation of a Church Profile and the unanimous appointment of two HPC representatives, lead wardens David Gooding and Margery Luffingham, who would then be involved directly in the application process with our Patron, Church Society, and the Diocese.

At the normal business PCC meetings there have been buildings and finance reports, safeguarding as well as wider reporting on a number of matters. There has again been a lot of activity regarding Premises and improvements particularly in connection with painting the interior walls of the main church, flooring and sound in the nave as well as works within the bellringing tower.

Thanks are recorded for the hard work of the Buildings and Finance Committees as well as the Safeguarding team which help to inform the PCC as they meet.

An important and significant area of reporting to the PCC in the past year has been on Church of England issues regarding Living in Love and Faith and now the decision at the recent General Synod meeting in February to welcome the House of Bishops' proposals contained in 'Prayers of Love and Faith' and there was an information morning on 25th February for HPC family. Please do pray for the church leaders and PCC as they prayerfully consider their response as they seek to remain faithful to Christ and biblical teaching and doctrine of the church.

As a PCC we give thanks for the Lord's kindness in the past year, particularly during the uncertain times in the Interregnum. We acknowledge our dependence on Him, and holding fast to biblical truths, we commit all that lies ahead to our sovereign, faithful, unchanging God.

Safeguarding

At Hailsham Parish Church, we strive to create an exciting, caring and safe environment in which to teach and demonstrate the love of Jesus to children, young people and adults. With this in mind, we aim to safeguard all those in our church family meeting on a Sunday morning and those we meet throughout the week at ABCs, Salt, Bridge Racing, YouthZone, holiday clubs and during pastoral visits.

The Diocesan Children's & Vulnerable Adults Safeguarding Policies have been adopted by HPC and are implemented in all our work with children, young people and vulnerable adults. All clergy, church wardens, PCC members, bell ringing tower captain/trainers and those who lead or help in these groups are required to have current Disclosure & Barring checks (DBS) and participate in regular safeguarding training. We continue to ensure that these are kept up to date, as both DBS checks and training must be renewed every 3 years (at a cost to HPC not the individual).



Whilst we are the safeguarding team, safeguarding is everyone's responsibility. If you have any concerns about conversations, behaviour or situations that may affect the safety or wellbeing of any child, young person or adult, please speak to the group leader then to Lyn Gooding.

Please pray that, as we seek to make Jesus known in our church family and in our town, we at HPC would continue to be wise and committed to the safeguarding of those in our care.

Open Church

It is such a privilege and a gospel opportunity with the church building being located in the centre of our town, a town with lots of people who we long for them to hear the good news of Jesus. It's good to be able to open the church building (hence the name Open Church) to offer a warm welcome, chat with visitors and have opportunity to point people to Jesus.



The west end entrance and lobby area with its enhanced visibility as well as the accessible footpath continues to make such a difference which we have seen in the increased number of visitors as well as the really positive comments of how welcoming it is when coming into the church building. A warm welcome is so important.

Open Church has run in a number of ways in the past year and thanks to all the team involved in this:

- Being open to coincide with larger community events in the town such as Bonfire Night (October), Christmas Light Switch on (November) and hosting and having an HPC stand at the 'What can I join in Hailsham? Event in January 2023 which had lots of community groups and visitors.
- Being open on Wednesday lunchtimes during more of the past year to welcome visitors as well as during more lunchtimes in the summer months.
- Additionally, the church building is open in a different way as it hosts external groups, concerts and events such as Hailsham Festival in September. On Remembrance Sunday an invitation goes out to all at the War Memorial to come back into the church building for coffee which is warmly appreciated by the large number of those that regularly do this.



A unique opportunity in 2022 was the Platinum Jubilee Celebration from 2-5 June 2022. This was a time of great celebration and coming together for our nation and communities across the country. There was lots going on in Hailsham too and many metres of bunting were decorated inside and outside the church building and the church building was lit up in red, white and blue as the special beacon in the town was lit.

A special civic service of Thanksgiving was held to pay tribute to and celebrate the Queen's historic reign marking 70 years of service to which the Mayor and community representatives were in attendance. The church building was open over the weekend with special refreshments and a Jubilee themed quiz and it was great to welcome so many from the community and to give out a special book about the Queen's faith in Jesus.

From celebration to sorrow as the country mourned the death of the Queen in September. The church building was open immediately in response and all the following week for people to come in and sign a book of condolence, to pray, and express their sadness and so many came in. It was such a privilege to serve our community in this way. There was a special service of Thanksgiving held at HPC for the life of Queen Elizabeth II giving thanks for her faithful service and








for her example of unswerving Christian faith and the church building was open to show the livestream of the State Funeral service from London for the community to come in and watch together.

Deanery Synod Report



The Deanery Synod has met twice since the April 2022 church profile. In June we met at St Philips, Burwash Weald when Rob Dillington, Deputy Director for Apostolic Life gave a presentation updating the Deanery on the Diocesan Strategy and Deanery Mission Action Planning. It was emphasised that Deaneries are free to work out their own priorities, and churches choose to utilise them or not. It was noted that there had been much change in congregations as a result of Covid.

November saw us convening at St George's Broad Oak when Martin Autor-Lloyd and Rebecca Hale spoke about the work of the Diocesan Association for Family Support Work. Many parishes have representatives involved, and it was

emphasised that there is always a need for more members to work alongside practitioners in various roles. It was noted that referrals are rising, especially in the current climate, and at the time of this meeting 450 families were being helped in various ways, and through different "crisis" situations.

There is usually a parish report at each Synod meeting and this year we have heard about the work at Burwash, Burwash Weald and Etchingham, where a new vicar was settling in; and Horam where they were feeling encouraged by a slow return after Covid. The Synod also received written reports on the General Synod meetings from July 2022 and the Diocesan Synod meeting in November 2022, where a gift was given to Bishop Martin to mark 10 years since his enthronement.

N.B. - The bungalow known as Lynton, which was owned by Hailsham PCC at the beginning of the year and the adjoining land surrounding the property, was sold during the year ended 31 December 2022..
 There was no rental income during this final period as the property was empty from December 2021.

The majority of the proceeds on the sale after deducting costs has been invested in the CCLA Deposit account and Klienwort Investment, both are reflected in the balance sheet on page 4 to these accounts. The remaining proceeds had been left in the HPC current account and is being used to cover the continuing shortfall, the deficit in the Expenditure over income as shown on page 2.

Extraordinary Items are made up of:Net (Losses for 2022 of £44,933 /losses 2021 (£107,154): These losses arise from sales and purchases of investment assets and loss on sale on the revaluation of Lynton property during the year to 31 December 2022.

I am sure you will appreciate this last year we have all been adversley effected by extreme external factors, the war in Ukraine, fuel prices and inflation. All putting pressures on the economy. These have also effected businesses which HPC deals with for the day to day running of the Church and has greatly affected the fluctuations within the Investment Fund.

Treasurer's Report

As always my thanks to everyone who has supported the Church with gifts both financially and with their time and efforts, of physical gifts during the year. Always very much appreciated, we give thanks to God for our Church family.

Finances continued to be a challenge. The accounts for the year to 31 December 2022 is beginning to highlight some of the price increases, and the effect on the running of HPC. Main example here being with Lighting and heating. Which includes the price increases during the final quarter of the year. These are rolling forward into our accounts for 2023.

Financially collections have been reasonably stable compared to prior year. We are however, not yet back up to pre Covid levels. When we consider inflationary affect collections have fallen.

We give thanks to our Clergy ,IT staff, volunteers, our musicians & office workers who have and continue to sacrifice much of their time both behind the scenes and actively in front to provide and support our church services, growth and youth groups, holiday clubs and much more to keep us uplifted & connected.

Ours thanks and praise to God for providing the skills and equipment required.

As highlighted last year The West End project within the Church building and the exterior works on the paths are now complete. This has proven to have been a true blessing and vision resulting in the bright and welcoming entrance we all now experience and for visitors to Hailsham and locals. Continuing, I understand to encourage people to pop in when passing.

We give thanks to Ken for his continued hardwork with the maintenance of the Church buildings and management of all repair works both for HPC and Emmanuel buildings. This support and advice continues to save substantial funds.

Sundry Income includes contributions towards Church events during the year. Our main event this year of course being the farewell and thank you to David and Kim on retirement. I am sure all who were able to attend would agree the Hog Roast afternoon was a pleasure and a fitting send off.

HPC accounts are now prepared formally by Caladine, Chartered Certified Accountants from Eastbourne. From which the above extracts have been prepared.

I give my thanks & appreciation to the Finance Team for help in the gathering of the information necessary to prepare management accounts, their guidance and assistance in decisions for the processing of the day to day figures. In particular to Roger for all the work, pressure and stress he has absorbed in bringing Lynton to its final and full crystalisation. Here too I thank Margaret, who I know has also made many sacrifices during this time. Thank you.

More importantly I give thanks to our Lord for his strength in all that he enables us to do at Hailsham Parsish Church.

General Overview

The main issues to this years finances has been :-

A} No new major works have been started this year. Though there are some smaller tasks that are continuing after the completion of the West End project for example electrical, cupboards, floor repairs and decorating. These items are disclosed within Repair costs on Page 2 in the Accounts.

As previously reported on page 3 to the Accounts, the Investment has been increased by the proceeds from the sale of Lynton stage two. Any income currently gained is being reinvested to generate income to help to maintain future staffing of HPC.

As previously reported the PCC, as custodians of the church property, under the Charities Act have a duty to maximise the return on any gifts to the church. To this end we are continuing with the previously agreed plan to maintain the Capital element as tangible fixed asset and is shown in the accounts. Some proceeds from the sale of Lynton Stage two has been held back from Investment to cover day to day running costs of HPC.

B} Cash Flow: As last year drawing on the funds invested from the sale of the land enabled us to meet our obligations in maintaining the current level of Church Activities. Cashflow continues to be an issue affecting finances for HPC. As shown by the General unrestricted funds accounts (see pages 1 and 2) which had deficits both last year of £225,619 and current year a deficit of £223,054.

Our regular and planned giving has increased by around £1,400 pa in 2022 which is approximately £116 per mth. This increase in regular giving is much appreciated, though still under our pre Covid levels. The shortfall in income to cover costs results in the requirement of the finance team to use investment funds for day to day running costs due to diminishing general funds available. Shortfalls have been supported by reserves brought forward from previous years and balance of investment funds, held since the sale of the land and the Bungalow from Lynton legacy.

The Parish Giving Scheme has continued to help the Cashflow in the prompt collecting of Gift Aid Tax relief. The scheme has been successfully taken up by a large portion of our members. Should anyone, who is a tax payer, like to join the scheme please see Roger Booth or myself for a sign up form. Your help in joining this scheme would be very much appreciated.

Without these gifts we could not have met our committed outgoings, we give thanks to God.

Unrestricted Income: (Page - Accounts 1)

As reported above regular collections & 'Committed giving' Income has increased but is still below budget target of £92,000 per annum. (7,670 per month) by around £1300 per annum ie £108 per month.

This 'giving' has been boosted by £22,815 refund of Tax, from the Inland Revenue due to Gift Aid Relief and Vat refunded from Listed Places of Worship Scheme. The total amount received for Unrestricted Income was a total of £178,847 in the year.

Restricted income surplus received in the year totalled £872.

Unrestricted Expenses: (Page – Accounts 2)

The combined Parish Contribution (pays for cost of clergy, housing etc.) was £115,579 in 2022.

Our Total Expenses were £401,901, leaving a deficit of £223,054 for the year on the unrestricted figures. This deficit includes costs repair costs of £46,687. The higher valued repairs in the year includes roof & velux repairs around £16K at HPC and £6K at Emmanuel. Other repair cost were for the New cupboards for south porch £3K Heating repairs £2K and the start of Quinquennial repairs £1,250.

Restricted fund income amounted to £68,827 so after deducting costs of £67,955 the surplus is £872.

Page 3 to the accounts provides details of the Restricted fund movements in the year and an explanation of how we arrive at the small restricted fund surplus of £872 mentioned above (surplus 2021 £469).

Legacies - A lasting gift to your church



All churches rely upon the support of generous Christians. Our giving is vitally important and helps sustain mission in this country, and overseas. Beyond our regular lifetime giving a gift in your will can be a final and powerful expression of your gratitude and thanksgiving towards God and can help transform your church's future.

The policy of the PCC is to use gifts in wills to help fund significant development projects in the parish whether it be buildings, equipment, or staff. Since needs change over the years, we do encourage people to leave a gift in their wills for the general purposes of the parish rather than a restricted purpose. Many people give regularly to the mission and ministry of the parish. But we are stewards of everything we own, not just our income, and gifts in wills are a natural part of that giving. They are a valuable and lasting way to invigorate the life of Hailsham Parish Church and help to transform its future.

Legacies come in many forms and sizes and as I write this, we have just been informed of a legacy to come from Margaret Cartledge's estate. In the last financial year, we received a very generous legacy from Les Winchester. Two examples of longstanding members of Hailsham Parish Church whose wish, after their passing is that the Gospel continues to be faithfully preached in Hailsham.

I always like to see statistics on various subjects so here are some I have come across on Legacies. From the results of the Anglican giving survey 2021, Anglicans are three times as likely to leave a gift to a Charity other than their church. It is reported that many Charities receive 50% to 60% of their income from Legacies. Although there does not appear to be recent figures for the Church of England it did quite recently show as low as 5%. So, it's no wonder that the central church is about to embark on a campaign. Bequests over the last 10 years have almost halved against a backdrop of increased deaths. One of the reasons for this low figure is thought to be that other charities are much better at promoting legacies and Christian Aid found that people were 18 times more likely to leave a gift in their will just by being asked. Legacies, both large and small are vital to financially assist Hailsham Parish Church in the ongoing work of spreading the Gospel of Jesus.

Just a reminder of some of the projects completed over the years due largely to members of the congregation thinking about the future and the ongoing work for God's Glory and continuing to make Jesus known in Hailsham after their death.

The Lounge with the original kitchen and toilets, the reordering of Emmanuel church, the work on the Chancel area. Then there was the updating of the kitchen and toilets and moving the office into the South Isle. The roof has been extensively repaired, the new organ and the pews replaced with chairs to give the flexibility to use the church building for more events. Finally opening the West End to use as the main

entrance to the church and making HPC even more welcoming to the community. However, of even greater importance it has enabled us to maintain staffing at the present levels now and, hopefully, for the future. We thank God for these forward thinking members of the Hailsham Parish Church congregation.

Apparently, research shows that people who make a will, will live longer than those who die intestate and further, that people who leave a gift to charity could live an extra two years. Not sure how true it is but must be worth thinking about. Perhaps the act of giving provides a liberating and rewarding experience that makes such individuals happier and healthier. As Jesus said, "Give and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured to you." (Luke 6.38)

Music

The aim of the music team at HPC is twofold:

- we seek, with our church leaders, to select hymns and songs
 whose words, when we sing them, build us up in Christ,
 serving the purposes of church, such as teaching and reflecting
 on Biblical truth, encouraging one another in the faith and
 praying to and praising God; and
- we seek to make good use of the musical gifts with which Christ has blessed our church, using them for its edification and to God's glory.



The **hymns and songs** we sing are chosen by Rory Graham and me, often with input from others, including staff and musicians. Over the past year, ten new songs have been introduced, including five children's songs.

Our **team** – including audio and visual technicians and action leaders – consists of fifty-four people, of whom forty-one serve on a regular basis. Sixteen people serve regularly as singers in the **choir**, five as **lead singers** and seventeen as **instrumentalists**. Steve Somerville and I lead rehearsals; Roger Tipping, our organist, plays for Sunday evening services as well as playing as part of the morning service rota; and Colin Dadswell co-ordinates the audio-visual team (see the AV Team report for more information). From time to time, an informal group is brought together to lead music on Sunday evenings. A small **music administration** team is just being formed to support with administrative tasks ranging from filing sheet music to developing a spreadsheet resource to aid the process of choosing songs for services.

As well as serving the regular Sunday congregations, musicians lead singing at **special services** at church and in the community (for example, at the care homes in the parish), and at **events** such as the church weekend away and the Easter and summer holiday clubs.



Special music in 2022 included a musical item on **Easter Sunday** morning, *Welcome, happy morning,* presented using two contrasting arrangements of the traditional French melody *Noel Nouvelet*. Later, at the end of August, twenty musicians came together for the **Service of Celebration** marking David and Kim Bourne's retirement – quite a musical feast to precede the edible one enjoyed by so many in the vicarage garden! It was a delight, at the start of October, to welcome *Sussex Harmony* back to HPC as they led

around ten of our own musicians along with guests from elsewhere in a west gallery music workshop, which culminated in an evening **harvest thanksgiving** service with liturgy from the Book of Common Prayer. At **Christmas**, our Carols by Candlelight service involved a choir of seventeen plus seven instrumentalists – a wonderful array of sonorities from organ to trumpet to cajon to chime bars complemented the voices of the choir and congregation.

Many of our home-grown song **recordings** made during the period of Covid-related restrictions have, over the past months, been uploaded to the HPC Songs playlist on our church's YouTube channel. These include

twenty-five Advent and Christmas recordings made in 2020 shared as a musical Advent calendar two years on. We hope our lockdown recordings may be a source of repeated encouragement to you.

Four whole-team events have taken place during the past year. In June, for the first time since 2019, we held a prayer, review and planning meeting. This helped shape plans for our group Bible study in November, our meal out at Callenders in January and our songs workshop in March. Looking ahead, a special training opportunity for our sound





Youth Band, supported by Michelle Lashley and John Kimble, continues to meet on Tuesday evenings during term time, usually fortnightly. We have tended to welcome six young people (aged 11+) to sessions that start with a brief time of Bible study and prayer and move on with practising one or more songs. Recently, we enjoyed harmonising and arranging a paraphrase setting of Zechariah's Song (Luke 1) written by one of



our members, Samuel Canning. Listen out – you may hear it sometime!

Thanks are due to Susie Graham for all her help over several years with **Junior Band**, which provides a chance for children aged 7-11 to make music together on occasional Saturday afternoons. Gill Heasman is kindly joining with me and John Kimble, meaning that this opportunity can continue to be offered.

Margaret Booth, Alex Dixon and Steve Somerville support the weekly after-school **Music Club** at **Phoenix Academy**. Pupils enjoyed Brazilian samba in the summer, Indonesian Gamelan in the autumn and creative composing in the spring! The club plays a part in developing links with the school, part of a group of four in the town where I also serve as chair of governors.

Thank you to everybody who has helped with church music in any way over the past year.

Please pray for the music team, especially that we would have an increased desire to make music to the glory of God.

Work in Schools

Here at HPC we love Jesus and seek to make him known. That's not just on a Sunday morning in the building but during the week and out in our local community. Seekers & Discoverers



Quest

Quest is the children's church teaching group for school years 7-9. We aim to guide the children to look at the bible in a deeper way and use a variety of teaching methods, including videos, dramatized readings and through questions and discussions.

Over the past year the teaching has bounced between Old and New Testament, from John to Esther, then Ephesians to Psalms and before Christmas looking Beyond the Manger to Jesus as our God, peacemaker, example, and priest.

This term, after two sessions of looking at the beautiful redemptive story of Ruth we embarked on a new series called "Who am I"; something slightly different and more personally challenging for the group as we explored what the bible has to say about our identity.




youngsters have come along to Youth Zone over the past year, with an average of ten attending each session.

Creative Craft Group




Coming up with new crafting ideas is indeed challenging but with God's help we manage to fill each term week.

Currently there are 10 people who regularly come and enjoy doing whatever the crafting topic is.

Bellringing

Bell ringing continues regularly. Numbers have increased a little and we now have a core of regular ringers for Sunday morning service ringing. Sunday evening quarter peals have continued for virtually every evening service with the help of other local ringers who are pleased to come and ring with us. Over Christmas we managed to get enough ringers to ring for four of the six services, ringing between two of the Christingle services and only missing the 7.30 a.m. service on Christmas morning.

It is expected that the bells will be rung for Sunday morning and evening services to call people to worship as they have done for hundreds of years. At the morning service we get as many of our ringers as possible to attend. For the evening service we get six or eight ringers and ring a "quarter peal" – this, in layman's terms, is ringing in a set pattern(s) (called a method) and lasts for about 40 minutes, non-stop. "Peals" are also rung at other times, to celebrate special events, and these last for around 3 hours non-stop although none have been rung at Hailsham for some time.

We practice on Monday evenings here at St Mary's. The few experienced ringers who came to help us prior to Covid have not returned but we have gained a few ringers from other local towers who come to us to improve their ringing. Again, this year we had an evening outing just before Christmas, ringing the bells at Chiddingly and having a meal together afterwards, which everyone very much enjoyed.

We were able to ring for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee early last year and then again when she was called home to be with her Lord. The bells were rung completely muffled (except for the tenor bell which was only

half muffled) on the announcement of her death and then completely open on the accession of Prince Charles to King, and again muffled until her funeral day. We did a lot of ringing!

There is a lot of publicity at the present time to get new ringers to learn in time for ringing for the coronation of King Charles II.

We have recently been lucky enough to get a couple of new ringers and we are always open to receive interest from other people who would like to learn or any lapsed ringers who like to come back.

Hailsham Foodbank

The biggest change for the foodbank in the past year is that we have now become a charity in our own right rather than a project of the Crosslink Trust. We are still very much a church led charity with the trustees remaining as leaders/elders of local churches.

The foodbank has seen its biggest increase in use since we began with the Cost of Living Crisis impacting most households. We particularly saw a significant rise around September. This has created many challenges for us both with ensuring we have adequate food and adequate funding. As always, we have seen some amazing provision when it's been most needed. We are working very hard with the agencies who refer to us to ensure that people are getting the best help they can. Our advisors from Citizens Advice and Community Money Advice have been very busy helping foodbank users with income maximisation and debt.



We were able to secure new warehouse space within Wealden District Council which came just at the right time and has helped to hold extra stocks with the purchase of additional racking.

We have been sourcing food regularly from other local foodbanks and also having to purchase food. If you are wishing to donate items please check our website, or download the BanktheFood app, so that you know what we need the most (to hopefully avoid us having to buy them). It also helps with our future

planning to have regular income so if you would like to set up a monthly donation towards our work see details on our website or pop in to 4 Market Square.

Thank you so much for all the prayers and support. We pray that God continues to sustain us and is very much with us in each interaction with have with the local community.

Reports from our Mission Partners

Julian and Nicky Milson - Valencia, Spain

Julian & Nicky Milson are missionaries in Valencia, Spain, along with Jemima (17) and Theo (15) their children. They have now been in Valencia for five years.

Julian is the Rector of the Anglican Church in Valencia which is part of the Reformed Episcopal Church of Spain. There's one Bishop (who is technically under the Archbishop of Canterbury) in Madrid and there are approximately 30 small congregations across the country. The Diocese of Spain works alongside the Church of England's Diocese in Europe.



Jim and Tanja French, Australian CMS Missionaries who run a theological training course called MOCLAM are part of the church family (and their two children) and they support the us very much as a family. Julian shares an office space with them and a local Spanish Christian journalist. In July, Chris and Rosy Redfearn and their daughter Lydia, a new Missionary family with Crosslinks, joined us. Chris is acting in the role of an informal Curate. Rosy now runs the Sunday School and closely supports individuals within the church.

The past year has been a good one for us as a church and we saw growth at both the beginning and end of the year after the decline in attendance as a result of the pandemic. At times we have been very close to capacity, which has been an enormous encouragement to us all. Weekly attendance does tend to fluctuate but the trajectory appears to be upwards.

Our Sunday School group consists of around 6 children. Most Sundays after the service there is an open invitation to join together to eat at a local (cheap!) pizzeria which helps us to continue fellowship late into the afternoon.

When people ask what our church is like, we usually describe it as a little taste of heaven. One of the reasons we say that is that there is a real sense of love and care for each other in our church family here. It is a true blessing from God and in the midst of lives full of various struggles; meeting on Sundays is a foretaste of the joy that awaits us in eternity. But another reason why our church is a glimpse of heaven is because we are so diverse. Old and young, men and women from at least 12 different countries come together to worship God and sing his praises.

In last year's report we mentioned how we had recently started a Youth Group and asked you pray for it. Thank you for praying! The group has worked really well with 8-12 young people attending. Recently we have moved to weekly meetings instead of fortnightly, one of the many things having the Redfearns here has given us the capacity to do.

In the Autumn term we tried a new evangelistic initiative to try to connect with people in the neighborhood. We opened the church on Monday mornings, with a sign outside, to see if people would come in for coffee and a chat. Only one person came who was not already a member of our church family. So we changed the time and day to try to connect with the people who were using the playground after school. Nobody came to the park! We decided to wait until the weather improves and there is more light in the afternoons. We plan to try again after Easter.

In December we had Christmas Carol services by candlelight. There were two services – one in English and one in Spanish. We had a Good number of visitors to both services and there was little space for more people. It's always a very good opportunity to invite people and for the first time this year our next-door neighbours came!

Nicky main role is to care for and support Jemima full time, and she is also continuing to learn Spanish when she has the time. She leads the music each week at church and plays the piano, is involved in planning All-Age services, leading the Youth Group, and hosting our mid-week bible study group.

Theo is studying hard at GCSEs (he is in Y10) and Spanish Studies at the British School and both children seem to be very settled. Jemima is learning 'life skills' and she spends a couple of hours per week with Rosy Redfearn.

Please pray:

- For plans to visit the UK this July, including a visit to HPC.
- Our families in the UK, that they would know and follow Jesus as their Saviour.
- For our church family; that we would each grow deeper in our faith and that everyone would take up the challenge of evangelism.
- That the Youth Group will continue to flourish and that the young people will be equipped to serve Christ faithfully every day.
- That the Sunday School will grow.
- That our Gospel witness would produce fruit.
- That people would make meeting together a priority whether it be Sundays or mid-week.
- Give thanks that the church family love Jesus and love each other.

May we take this opportunity to thank you all for your prayerful support - it is a joy to partner with you in the gospel work here in Valencia.

Chris & Ros Howles - UMS Namugongo, Kampala.

If there's one word to sum up what's happening at Uganda Martyrs Seminary Namugongo (UMSN) right now, it's this: growth!

UMSN is a bible college on the outskirts of Kampala training people for church leadership across Uganda and East Africa. We (Chris and Ros Howles, with our 3 kids Josh aged 13, Danny aged 11, and Chloe aged 9) have been living and working here since 2011 joining together with our Ugandan colleagues to help train and equip men and women for gospel ministry and church leadership. Students are with us for 2-3 years, and our ambition as a college is to help them know, trust, and obey Christ such that they'll be sent out and help others to do the same.

For the past 40 years the college has had between 25 and 95 students in training at any given time. Right now, that number is almost 300, making UMSN the largest Bible training college in Uganda to our knowledge! It is, of course, God who gives the growth, and we're profoundly thankful for the remarkable opportunities we now have to equip so many people to preach, pray, pastor and lead churches with Christ at the heart. In fact, our current students alone will be preaching and pastoring to probably over 2million people in the coming years of their ministries. Please pray that the Lord would use as a college to lay a strong, word-centred, gospel-driven, Spirit-motivated and Christ-focussed foundation. Pray that we and the other staff here would not only teach, but also live out as models, what the Lord wants to see in this next generation of Uganda church leaders.

Of course, such rapid and unfathomable growth does create challenges, humanly-speaking! It's fair to say that this is a tiring season! But we're grateful to God for strengthening and sustaining us all. Please continue to pray that our marriage, family life, personal devotional times and ministries would be healthy, relational, and full of loving kindness. Please continue to pray for Ros as she home schools the kids, as well as leading Bible studies for female students, helping with students' health issues, hosting plenty of visitors, and many other tasks, and for the kids, that they would know Christ as their King and friend and Lord as they continue growing up here in Uganda.

Visiting the Howles in Uganda. In June I had the opportunity to join an Oak Hill College trip to Uganda Martyrs Seminary. We had a fantastic week, learning alongside the Ugandan students and training them in Bible handling and application skills. New ministries starting. In the last year we have relaunched our stay-and-play preschool group, called Little Fishes. We have also revamped our primary age after-school club, The Ark. I've been very thankful for experiences in Hailsham at ABCs and Pulse, which have really helped as we've considered why and how to run these groups. I am very encouraged by a small group of women who are asking big questions about Jesus.

Cultivate training. In January I started a two-year training course called Cultivate. This is aimed at training Christians to write on cultural issues of special interest to them. We're a small group, with diverse areas of expertise, including poetry, the theology of sound and artificial intelligence. So far I've loved the opportunity to stretch my mental muscles!

I'm so thankful for your ongoing prayers. Over the coming months, some particular things for prayer include:

Responding to the Church of England. I'm involved with a local network of evangelicals considering how to respond to the recent developments in the Church of England. This is a painful and difficult issue. Please pray for wisdom as we make decisions, and for joy in the Lord Jesus throughout.

Sunday services. In the next few months our music co-ordinator and lead AV technician will be moving away. Please pray that God will provide for us. And please pray that I will serve sacrificially and wisely, knowing what to prioritise each week.

Philippians 1:9-11. Please pray that my "love may abound more and more in knowledge and depth of insight, so that I may be pure and blameless for the day of Christ, filled with the righteousness that comes through Christ Jesus – to the glory and praise of God." I certainly pray this for you.


